The Katikkiro of Buganda, Charles Peter Mayiga handed over a donation of sickle cell testing kits to the Minister of Health, Hon Dr. Jane Ruth Aceng during a ceremony that was held on 24th November 2017 at UNHLS Headquarters in Butabika. This donation was from the proceeds of the sickle cell run to mark the Kabaka's Birthday on 9th April 2017 and the run was also featured in the May 2017 issue of the eNotice Board.

The Katikkiro was very grateful to all partners who made the run a success while contributing to this donation. The Minister of Health for Buganda Kingdom, Dr. Kiwanuka Mukwaya said that sickle cell disorder can only be cured by bone marrow transplant and advised all partners to screen for the disorder before marriage as a preventive measure. Flanked by the Permanent Secretary Ministry of Health, Dr. Atwiine Diana and the UNHLS Executive Director, Dr. Susan Nabadda Ndidde; Hon Ruth Aceng re-enforced partnership with Buganda Kingdom and Ministry of Health and appealed for awareness about the sickle cell disorder among the population.

THE ELECTRONIC LAB SPARS DATABASE APPEARS ON UNHLS DASHBOARD

The electronic laboratory SPARS is an online database hosted on the UNHLS servers and accessed through the UNHLS dashboard to allow SPARS supervisors across the country to instantly submit and analyze logistics data and provide prompt feedback to stakeholders.

On 22nd November 2017, UNHLS in collaboration with USAID/Uganda Health Supply Chain Program officially launched this database after an extensive computer training of 42 Lab SPARS supervisors that begun on 13th November 2017 at Silver Springs Hotel, Bugolobi. Training involved computer use and maintenance and utilization of Lab SPARS database. Each supervisor received a new Lenovo Yoga 11e ThinkPad Laptop and internet modem loaded with internet bundles to facilitate online access.

TRAINER OF TRAINERS FOR POINT OF CARE TESTING (POCT)

Due to the numerous advantages of POCT, the current trend is to encourage POCT by non laboratory persons including nurses and midwives. POCT is a medical test done to a patient at a care site or bedside. The laboratory person should maintain the quality assurance aspect of POCT and they have developed a POCT policy at national level as well as national guidelines. Capacity has to be built through TOTs on the implementation of the policy and guidelines.

On 20th November 2017, there was a 3 days TOT for Jinja and Masaka districts about the national policy and guidelines, knowledge and skills related to the international standards leading to POCT accreditation and to equip health workers with quality related skills including; internal quality control (IQ), external quality assessment (EQA), Validation/Verification aspects.

UNHLS REVIEWS PERFORMANCE PLANS WITH IPs

UNHLS strategic plan is put in operation by Implementing Partners (IPs) working with Development Partners (DPs). The DPs and IPs have MOUs with UNHLS to perform different aspects of UNHLS strategic plan. There is always a need to review this performance every six months to better align with UNHLS plan while reducing adhoc implementation and duplication.

On 15th November 2017, IP Laboratory advisors had a meeting at UNHLS Butabika, to review performance of individual IPs for the last six months and plan for the next six months.

Compliance to standards is one of the roles of the Uganda Medical Laboratory Technology Association (UMLTA) performed during its annual scientific conference. One of the objectives of UMLTA is to promote and maintain high standards of professionalism and excellence in Medical Laboratory Service delivery in Uganda and beyond.

On 1st November 2017, UMLTA organized its annual scientific conference in Arua with the theme, "Laboratory Systems Strengthening for a Resilient Health System" There were presentations of annual findings and projects from UMLTA members including exhibitions of ideas products within the laboratory sector

UNHL TO CREATE A PROFILE FOR MASTERS AND PHD HOLDERS IN LABORATORY MEDICINE

There is a need to develop the laboratory sector and find solutions to challenges within the sector. This requires harvesting and harnessing the capabilities of research and learning attained from academic institutions. Laboratory persons with higher qualifications from academic institutions are capable of bringing on board innovations and solutions to challenges when they are organized as a "think tank". UNHLS intends to create a profile of these persons and periodically engage them in related objectives and create a recognized research agenda for the laboratory sector.

On 16th November 2017, identified masters and PhD holders had a meeting with UNHLS Senior Management Team (SMT) at Butabika where the idea of creating a profile was discussed. Among other ideas discussed was the establishment of a peer reviewed academic journal for the Laboratory Sector that meets international standards and support research work from academicians in Uganda.

BIO SAFETY TRAINING FOR HUB BIKE RIDERS

UNHLS strategic plan provides for strengthening human resource capacity for biosafety and Biosecurity program through trainings for improved practices. Biorisk combines aspects of biosafety and Biosecurity and is about ensuring work place safety and security in protection of personnel, the public and environment from infectious biological materials (samples) and injuries from the process of handling. It is important for the protection of both accidental exposures to health workers and community; and for intention exposures through intent to harm, steal or misuse valuable biological materials (VBM).

Hub bike riders move laboratory samples along the transport network. Using demonstrations and videos, hub riders were introduced to aspects of biorisk management, bioethics and code of conduct, personal protective equipment, decontamination, sterilization and disinfection, among others, during a training that took place from 16th – 18th November 2017.

Other activities

- There was a need to acquire system requirements and details of QA key performance indicators to monitor services offered by laboratory facilities. This was done in a 3 day workshop involving system developers and Development Partners on 30th November 2017. Therefore, the quality assurance (QA) database will soon appear on UNHLS dashboard to monitor key performance indicators centrally.
- In efforts to empower PLWHA to demand for viral load testing, UNHLS organized a pre-World AIDS Day Viral Load Awareness Camp at Butabika on 30th November 2017.
